Worship Theme Faith in Active Obedience to the Lord's Will

"Order of Service"







There are two new items in front of church that have been anonymously donated to enhance our worship, a paschal candle to draw attention to the baptismal font and a crucifix to point us to the center of our worship: Christ crucified. Below are descriptions of both:

The Paschal Candle is a single candle which symbolizes Christ as the Light of the World. It is lit during the Easter Season, at baptisms, and at funerals. Each of these times or events have a deep connection between Christ's resurrection and his followers. St. Paul says that we die and rise with Christ in baptism (Rm. 6:1-3). Our sinful natures die, we are made alive in Christ, and promised our own resurrection. Thus the paschal candle (Paschal means Passover, the Jewish holiday during which Jesus died and rose and has come to be the name for Easter in Orthodox Churches), is placed in a prominent place during the Easter season, by the casket/urn at funerals and by the baptismal font when not in use. Paschal candles also have on them the alpha and omega (Rev. 22:13), five "nails" which symbolize the five wounds of Christ, and the year.

A crucifix is a cross with the body of Christ on it. It is a striking reminder of the culmination of the salvation story, the crucifixion of Christ with all of its pain and horror. This is the center of our faith as St. Paul declares, "We preach Christ crucified" (1 Cor. 1:23). This makes little sense to human philosophy or reason as St. Paul continues, "a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles". Why follow a dying God? But this is the whole point. We trust what God says and did, not just what we see and rationalize. We see a horrific death but we hear about salvation in that death. Finally, we are made aware of a love that we cannot find anywhere else: God died for us!



Therefore have I set my face like flint, and I know I will not be put to shame. ⁸He who vindicates me is near. Who then will bring charges against me? Let us face each other! Who is my accuser? Let him confront me! ⁹It is the Sovereign LORD who helps me. Who is he that will condemn me? They will all wear out like a garment; the moths will eat them up. ¹⁰Who among you fears the LORD and obeys the word of his servant? Let him who walks in the dark, who has no light, trust in the name of the LORD and rely on his God.


Gospel Lesson: Mark 8:27-35

²⁷ Jesus and his disciples went on to the villages around Caesarea Philippi. On the way he asked them, "Who do people say I am?" ²⁸ They replied, "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." ²⁹ "But what about you?" he asked. "Who do you say I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Christ." ³⁰ Jesus warned them not to tell anyone about him. ³¹ He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, chief priests and teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. ³² He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³ But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. "Get behind me, Satan!" he said. "You do not have in mind the things of God, but the things of men." ³⁴ Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: "If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. ³⁵ For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it.

Sermon Theme: "The Law of Love"

- 1. It does not show favoritism. Verses 1-5, 8-10
- 2. It translates faith into actions. Verses 14-18

Sermon Text: James 2:1-5, 8-10. 14-18

¹My brothers, as believers in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ, don't show favoritism. ² Suppose a man comes into your meeting wearing a gold ring and fine clothes, and a poor man in shabby clothes also comes in. ³ If you show special attention to the man wearing fine clothes and say, "Here's a good seat for you," but say to the poor man, "You stand there" or "Sit on the floor by my feet," 4 have you not discriminated among yourselves and become judges with evil thoughts? ⁵ Listen, my dear brothers: Has not God chosen those who are poor in the eyes of the world to be rich in faith and to inherit the kingdom he promised those who love him? 8 If you really keep the royal law found in Scripture, "Love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing right. ⁹ But if you show favoritism, you sin and are convicted by the law as lawbreakers. ¹⁰ For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point is guilty of breaking all of it. ¹⁴ What good is it, my brothers, if a man claims to have faith but has no deeds? Can such faith save him? ¹⁵ Suppose a brother or sister is without clothes and daily food. ¹⁶ If one of you says to him, "Go, I wish you well; keep warm and well fed," but does nothing about his physical needs, what good is it? ¹⁷ In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. ¹⁸ But someone will say, "You have faith; I have deeds." Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by what I do.

After his shipwreck and wintering on the island of Malta, the prisoner Paul sailed to the Italian port of Puteoli, still 150 miles from Rome. Although Acts 28:13-15 gives only the briefest of descriptions of his land journey, the text does make it clear that he arrived in Rome on that most famous of roads, the Appian Way. However, the Appian Way passes 20 miles to the north of Puteoli. Using the results of several trips to Italy, archeological publications and even Google Maps, Dr. Thompson will describe the ancient routes available to Paul's party. We will then follow Paul along the road he most likely walked to reach the Appian Way.

Dr. Glen L. Thompson holds a M.Div. from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary and a M.A. and Ph.D. in ancient history from Columbia University. From 2002-2011 he was a Professor of History at Wisconsin Lutheran College. He then assumed the position of Academic Dean and Professor of New Testament and Historical Theology at Asia Lutheran Seminary in Hong Kong until his retirement last year. His early research centered on the first four centuries of Christianity and has since expanded into early Christianity in China and the Roman road system used by St. Paul. Together with Dr. Mark Wilson, he has led students on numerous trips to Turkey, Greece, and Italy. His research seeks to identify the exact paths of the Roman roads, resulting in several scholarly articles. His book on Paul's journey to Rome in Acts 28, co-authored with Dr. Wilson, will appear in 2022 from Lexham Press.
